### **Definitions of each**

- Emergency Room/ ER- Urgent medical emergency there is a wait time at the hospital depending on the issue. Can call 911 if issue is urgent
- Primary care Doctor- consistent care (Doctor the whole family can see)
- Pharmacy- where you pick up your medication
- Speciality Doctor- specific problem (primary doctor will refer you)
- Urgent care- immediate non medical emergency (minor issues like ear infection)

# **Urgent Care**

**Urgent Care-**

immediate non medical emergency (minor issues like ear infection), be cautious of closing time

#### **Some Symptoms For Urgent Care**

- Fever without a rash
- Vomiting
- Abdominal pain
- Wheezing or shortness of breath
- Dehydration
- Moderate flu-like symptoms
- Sprains and strains
- Small cuts that may require stitches



## **Primary Care Doctor**


- A Primary Care Doctor is one that can offer consistent care (Doctor the whole family can see)
- Doctor for yearly checkups




# **Speciality Care Doctor**

- This is a doctor for a specific part of your body.
- Primary Care Doctor refers you








# **Emergency Room**

- For immediate medical emergencies
- There can be a waiting time depending on how urgent the medical issue is
- If it is late at night and the urgent care is closed go to the ER



### Pharmacy difference in US



- Different pharmacies include
- 1. CVS (can be found in local grocery store sometimes)
- 2. Walgreens
- 3. Rite aid

- Must have prescription written by Doctor in order to pick up medication, sometimes insurance won't cover certain medications
- At the end of a visit doctor will ask for a pharmacy to send medication choose the one closest to your home





#### Scheduling an appointment with your doctor

- 1. Let them know if you're a new patient. You may have to wait a few weeks to get an appointment, especially if you're a new patient. If you call your provider's office because you're sick, you may be able to see them the same day.
- 2. Tell them the reason for your visit. You might be looking for a new primary care provider or you might need to come in because you have a specific concern, like the flu, allergies, or depression.
- 3. Give them the name of your health insurance plan. If you have Medicaid or CHIP coverage let them know.
- 4. Find out if you need to bring anything to the visit, like medical records or current medications.
- 5. It's important to know the name of the provider you'd like to see. You may have to wait longer for an appointment if you request a specific provider, so they might recommend another provider in your network who has availability if you're feeling sick and need to come in sooner.
